On August 7th 1974, a French man named Philippe Petit, a wirewalker from Paris, was to accomplish his dream of walking on a wire between New York City's Twin Towers, the tallest building in the world at that time. Petit, a man of tenacity, discovered his future in the news paper when he was 17 years old. The newspaper had a picture of the World Trade Center that would be built someday. He was obsessed with the towers even before they were fully constructed. He started to dream of a moment for the whole world to see and believe in. He started practicing, walking on the Notre Dame Cathedral and the Sydney Harbor Bridge. Petit traveled to the United States of America and sneaked into the World Trade Center several times to determine the equipment he needed to accomplish his daring feat. A movie called *Man on Wire*, which was directed by James Marsh, is about wirewalker Philippe Petite's achievement. The first reason is Petit wanted to create a work of art. Annie, his girlfriend, said, "Each day is like a work of art for him." Philippe is a purist, and creating interesting scenes for people is what matters most to him. For example, he performed on the wire by dancing and moving

back and forth for nearly an hour between the two towers. Petit lay on the middle of the thin wire; both hands were placed across his chest, and his rolling stick was placed under his neck. Few minutes, he moved to the right hand side of the wire closed to the end, placed his rolling stick at the middle of his palm, and started to roll it gently and slowly with marching footsteps to their other side of the rope. Then, he kneeled on the wire to watch the crowd below him with a beautiful smile.

Another reason that motivated Petit was to become famous. After he walked on the wire between the Twin Towers, he became popular everywhere he went. For instance, a lot of people started pointing fingers at him and news paper writers begun to publish articles about him. TV and radio stations invited him for interviews. Also, he captured the world's attention while he was on the wire. All eyes were on him while he walking on the wire. The entire sidewalks were occupied with thousands of people.
