## ACADEMIC PROGRAM REVIEW SWOT: Strength, Weakness, Opportunities, and Threats

SWOT (strengths, weakness, opportunities, and threats) was created as a business model for organizational strategic planning. Developed in the 1960s at the Stanford Research Institute (SRI, International) by Robert Steward, Albert Humphrey and co-workers, the research conducted led to the development of the SWOT analysis tool.

SWOT analysis is intended as part of an assessment technique to help units identify and discuss all factors that impact the unit. In discussing and presenting factors that are favorable and unfavorable to future improvements, effectiveness and efficiency of the unit, SWOT helps foster a collaborative environmental scan in which all can participate. The goal of SWOT is to provide meaningful information for each of the categories to inform future decision making. SWOT coupled with assessment helps units to self-evaluate and determine future direction related to unit goals and objectives, aligning with institutional mission and goals.
