The New Integrated Assessment Cycle is Here

The image to the right represents an overview of the new integrated assessment cycle.

The new cycle combines all assessment functions into one cycle for each discipline.

This simplified cycle is being rolled out this year. Disciplines will enter the cycle at different stages.

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Overview of the New Assessment Schedule

A linear view of the new assessment cycle is listed below. Each discipline has been assigned an entry point into the new sequence that is specifically designed to accommodate that discipline's current assessment activities for the 2020–2021 academic year.

*Entry Point in the new cycle for the 2020/2021 academic year will vary for each discipline.

Quick Overview of New Cycle Changes

- Each discipline has one continuous cycle for assessment (instead of three overlapping time sequences for CAR, Program Assessment, and General Education).
- Reflection Report due dates are the same for both General Education and Program Assessment and are combined into an Integrated Report in Year 3 of the cycle and reported in the CAR.
- Only two sections of the cycle involve report writing: Year 1 (CAR) and Year 3 (the Integrated Report)
- Years 1, 2, 4 and 5 are planned data collection years and involve quick drop-down menus to document what assessment activities a discipline has done that year.
- For those disciplines with general education courses, recertification of those courses will take place two years after a discipline completes its CAR Report.

Featured Article:

Establishing a Culture of Assessment

In 2009, Wendy Weiner wrote an article about establishing a successful "culture of assessment" in higher education. The article talks about the 15 items listed below that are required for a culture of assessment to be successfully instilled within a college setting. Several of these items are highlighted as MC's new assessment process is initiated. This **new initiative** was molded by faculty and administrative feedback within focus groups, committees, and an academic integration group. The new cycle will be both **practical and sustainable**, will offer **ongoing assessment professional development opportunities**, will promote a **common vocabulary for assessment terms**, will be **systemic in nature**, will support and show **connections between General Education goals and our comprehensive program review**, will encourage **faculty ownership of data collection schedules** within disciplines and programs.
