Objectives:

- Develop an arguable topic of civic and/or global relevance to explore this essay.
- Find reliable sources to summarize, paraphrase, or quote to support the thesis.
- Balance the varied perspectives of the selected sources.
- Use the principles of argument and the appropriate rhetorical technique(s).
- Contribute a unique insight to the scholarly articles already available on the topic.

Instructions:

- Skim pages 478 543 of Rules for Writers (again) about writing research papers.
- Read chapters 12 and 13 in <u>Practical Argument</u> about the themes of "Fake News" (pages 409-435) and "(Anti-)Social Media" (pages 437-473).
- Write a Research Paper supported by 10+ sources developing your own perspective
 on a topic related to the themes of "Fake News," "(Anti-)Social Media," or a topic
 approved by your professor. Up to three texts can be from the book. As always,
 sources (-like "Text #1" and "Text #2" on BB-) located via the MC library database are
 the best ones!
- Make sure your paper is in APA style.
- Save your Word document as "Last Name-Essay #4" and print it in class on the day
 the syllabus states it is due and only 5 minutes before the end of class (NOT
 before it!) Print on both sides and "erase" any empty spaces!
